*3rd October* **Chester Zoo, Past and Present** Penny Rudd, the zoo's Registrar, will take us through developments since the zoo was opened by George Mottershead in 1931 to become the UK's 2<sup>nd</sup> most popular visitor attraction in 2017.

*10th October* **The Beauty in the Heavens** Professor Ian Morison will show some of the Solar System's and Earth's most fantastic heavenly phenomena including eclipses and auras, and explain how they are created.

*17th October* **Stand up for Nature** Jeff Clarke presents a topical and thought-provoking political commentary on the State of Nature today in the UK and an indictment on those who are supposed to protect it.

*24th October* **In Search of Cocoa ... a Columbian Adventure** Andrew Heading and friends found an old map of Columbia. In a pair of inflatable canoes, they set off to rediscover the old cocoa trade route through the jungle.

*31st October* **The Story of a Street** Bridge Street in Chester is over 2,000 years old. David Cummings tells its sometimes surprising story using unique photos and other evidence.

7<sup>th</sup> November **Brief Encounters** Paul Harris presents photos from a journey following in the footsteps of Genghis Khan to his more recent work in Greenland, India, the Peruvian Amazon and the Yorkshire Dales.

14<sup>th</sup> November **The Sculpture and Art of Steve Broadbent** Stephen's work can be found in cities and landscapes throughout Britain, including several prominent and familiar sculptures in Chester.

9<sup>ty</sup> January **Children of the World** In the many years that Tony Ord has been travelling he has photographed the peoples of the varied parts of the world that he has visited. He will share the pictures of the children and their stories.

16<sup>th</sup> January **Over the Hills and Far Away - The Life of Beatrix Potter** Matthew Dennison, who recently published a new biography of Beatrix Potter talks about her life.

*23<sup>rd</sup> January* **Lord Leverhulme – Lord of the Isles** Gavin Hunter will tell the tale of how Lord Leverhulme bought the Hebridean island of Lewis and Harris and tried to preserve and revitalise their economies.
